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## 1. Purpose



The enrollment rate for high schools serving a majority of economically disadvantaged studies a percentage points lower than the state average.

#### 2.2.3Continuous Improvement Cycle

#### 2.24 College & Career Readiness Training

To ensure the alignment of the CCARdvising organization and assigned LEAs, a training will be heldprior to the start of the school year with each district. The assigned LEA will provide the advising organization training on their student data syste(st), school operational policies and procedures, and space allocation for advision agendanust be approved by TEA prior to the implementation of the training.
