- the physical premises of a school, but only: (1) in the manner provided by written regulations adopted by the board of trustees or the governing body; and (2) at a specific school specified by the board of trustees or governing body.

- Requirements for marshal candidates include:
 - a. Employee of a school district
 - b. Possess a current firearm license to carry (LTC)
 - c. Approved by the governing body
 - d. Pass a psychological examination (TCOLE L3)
 - e. Complete the 80-hour Marshal course
 - f. Submit the School Marshal Appointment form and fee
 - g. Complete 16-hour renewal course every 2 years
